Subject: - Rejoinder about Box item mentioning Delhi as “CRIME capital”.

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Sir,

This refers to the above box news item appeared in Indian Express today dated 9-7-2008. The caption is factually incorrect and misleading.

The news item starts “Sending another chilling reminder that the Capital has been found to be among the top ten crime infested cities in the world”. This itself is highly misleading as this refers to the total incidence of crime and not the rate of crime. Since criminogenic factors vary, it is not entirely feasible or advisable to compare crime in one city with another. This, notwithstanding, crime can broadly speaking be compared on the basis of the population and the common yardstick adopted worldwide is viewing the incidence of crime per lakh of population. United Nations Office of Drugs and Crime conducts periodical surveys regarding crime trends.

The Eighth United Nations survey on crime trends and the operations of Criminal Justice Systems (2000-2002), the grand total of recorded crimes rate per lakh of inhabitants of 54 countries down loaded from the Website www.unodc.org/unodc indicates that crime per lakh of population in India which is 167.7 (in 2006) is substantially lower than the crime per lakh of population than 49 of 52 countries listed in the UN survey. Only 3 of the 52 countries listed have a lower crime rate. The chart is enclosed herewith for ready reference. The crime rate of Delhi is 357.2 (in 2006). Crime in metropolitan/other cities are invariably higher than the overall country ratio. Still in comparison with the crime incidence shown in the UN Survey, Delhi figures very very low as far as incidence of crime per lakh of population is concerned.

According to Crime In India-2006, Annual NCRB publication, NCT of Delhi has higher rate (crime per lakh of population) of total cognizable compared to other States and Union territories. Delhi has 357.2 as rate of total cognizable crime among the all States and Union Territories of India following Pondicherry which ranks first with a rate of 447.7.

According to the same report the comparative rate of total cognizable crimes of 35 “Mega” cities with population of more than 10 lakhs in 2006 was: Indore

769.1, Bhopal 719.5, Jaipur 597.1, Vijaywada 579.8, Jabalpur 559.0, Patna 494.0, Nagpur 470.6, Bangalore 462.2, Faridabad 443.8, Ahmedabad 425.7, Kochi 420.6 and Delhi 414.4. Even amongst Indian Mega cities, Delhi is ranked 02.

Crime in Delhi is under control and in fact declining and there is no spiraling crime graph as has been indicated in the caption as CRIME capital. Heinous crime has fallen by 8.49 % with 1035 cases during the year 2008 (upto 30th June) as compared to 1131 cases in the corresponding period of last year. Likewise non-heinous crime has fallen by 12.08% with 24089 cases during the year 2008 (upto 30th June) as compared to 27353 cases in the corresponding period of last year. The head-wise comparative crime statement is enclosed herewith, which is self-explanatory.

Delhi is a vibrant city with increasing urbanization, some of an unplanned nature, a population crossing 165 lakhs and vehicular numbers touching 56 lakhs. There are a variety of crimogenic factors which impact crime. These include socio-economic factors such as unemployment, disparities in income and living conditions, lack of basic civic amenities particularly in jhuggi-jhopris and unauthorized colonies, adverse sex ratio, continual in-migration outpacing the development of infrastructure and availability of working opportunities, a consumer culture with umpteen TV channels continually selling a life style, particularly through advertisements, which many want but cannot legitimately obtain, the rendering of state boundaries infructuous because of the expansion of transport and communication facilities causing unfettered movement of criminals, criminal gangs etc.

Due to the large number of vehicles in Delhi (more than 56 Lakhs) the incidence of accident cases in Delhi in 2006 was 9699. This is almost equal to the total cognizable crime of Kolkata which is 9381. In fact, it is higher than the total incidence of cognizable crime in 24 of the 35 other Mega cities listed in the Crime in India-2006. This had also resulted in the high incidence of MV Theft i.e. 9366.

In view of the above stated facts and circumstances, it is requested that the correct facts of the matter may be published with the same prominence for your esteemed readers. It will also be appreciated if the reporter is advised to get the facts verified from the concerned authority before publishing such sensitive matters which tends to cause alarm among the general public.
